






## Challenges

#### Synchronizing two different course curricula

Marburg's curriculum and study materials differ from those in Ukraine, necessitating adjustments in study strategies and learning styles.






## Challenges

#### Different Academic Calendars

The winter semester begins in **September in Ukraine** but starts in **October in Germany**, while the summer semester starts in **February in Ukraine** and in **April in Germany**, creating challenges for synchronization.



Differences in the study system and teaching techniques

Ukrainian: structured with regular guidance

German: emphasizes independent learning

- ☐ Confusion in assignments and workload
- ☐ Extra support for self-directed research
- ☐ Guidance needed for adapting to autonomy



Clear **guidelines and instructions** were provided and the expectations for assignments were clearly communicated . **Peer - to - Peer support** was offered to help adjust to the new study process

# Future Directions to Strengthen Ties with European Higher Education

**Expand Joint Research**: Align research projects with **EU priorities to integrate Ukrainian** institutions into the European Research Area.

Harmonize Curriculum: Develop joint curricula with synchronized academic calendars and credit systems (ECTS) for easier student and faculty mobility.

Enhance Digital Learning: Strengthen virtual academic collaboration to bridge educational system differences.

Build Capacity: Provide training for Ukrainian educators on EU policies and research practices Address Structural Challenges: Simplify administrative and legal processes to enable joint degrees and qualifications.

Inclusivity: Ensure displaced Ukrainian students and faculty have access to European education. Plan for Long-term: Develop strategic goals that align with Ukraine's EU accession and the Bologna Process.
