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ABOUT EUPEACE WP5 – CAMPUS AND STUDENT LIFE

The aim of this Work Package is to establish our Inclusive European Campus. This campus is the main lever to deeply internationalise the institutions, so that the default background against which all staff and students carry out their activities will be an international scenario. This implies a strong commitment to diversity and inclusiveness, and conceiving our campus, in both its virtual and physical forms, as a means of empowering everyone, regardless of culture, race, gender and ethnicity, to develop to their full potential as future agents for change. Our Inclusive European Campus is a cross-sectional and long-term task towards developing and implementing sustainable Alliance structures.

The objectives are

- To build a joint inclusive European inter-university EUPeace campus
- To establish inclusion and equality as core shared values to enable excellent conditions for learning, teaching, research, and innovation
- To turn the campus into a model inclusive space for students, faculty, and staff.



Student Challenges Call for Proposals

What are the Student Challenges?

The EUPeace Alliance invites student associations or clubs from our nine universities to propose and organise shared and impactful Student Challenges involving a minimum of two EUPeace member universities. The Student Challenges aim to encourage the creation of projects by students for students.

The generic structure of a challenge is expected to unfold as follows:

1. Identification of any issue, situation or condition on campus that is detrimental to the principles of “peace”, “justice”, and “inclusive societies” with any type of manifestation. The identification itself is part of the challenge.
2. Getting students on campus engaged in devising possible solutions to the issue. It might not be an ultimate solution or a unique one. Inclusivity involves the acceptance of different perspectives on the same issue.
3. Discussion, as broad as possible, among the student community to arrive at operational guidelines and/or specific actions, if any specific action can solve or mitigate the issue.
4. Dissemination of the full array of solutions.
5. Reporting about participation and the results.

The Student Challenges are designed to foster cohesion and inclusion of the campus community.

How does it work?

One application session is organised each academic year based on one or two strategic thematic focuses.

For 2024-2025, the students selected the theme of social and solidarity economy. This call 2025-2026, will focus on peace building and social life.

- Theme 1: Strengthening Peace: How students and universities can become active agents of peace through concrete actions.
- Theme 2: Student Participation in Social Life: The university as a catalyst for inclusion and civic engagement.

A Commission including student representatives will be in charge of the selection.

The selected Student Challenges results will be published on the EUPeace website.

The selected projects receiving funding are required to submit an interim report before the end of the calendar year.

Type of the Student Challenge

The format of the initiative is open (survey, report, mobility, conference, tool drafting, policy paper,

specifications to promote specific purchases, local event, film production, podcast creation, etc.).

Proposal Requirements

To ensure a cohesive, well-planned, and impactful event, we request that applicants provide the following information in their proposal.

1. Information about Project Leader

The project leader is the contact person at the level of the partnership.

The partnership must include a minimum of two student associations from two different EUPeace member universities.

2. Project Title

Provide a tentative or working title reflecting the essence of the proposed Student Challenge. At this stage, transparency is more important than catchy titles. If you have a winning title, though, you are more than welcome to use it, followed by a more descriptive title, if needed.

3. Calendar of the Project

Outline the key dates: start and end date of the project, preparation stages, event dates, and any follow-up activities, if any. Note that projects are invited to start from April 2026 and must be administratively closed by the 31st of October 2026 including final reporting from your side.

4. Project Description

Describe the event in 250-500 words, covering the main objectives, activities, and target audience. Please include the type of Student Challenge (e.g. survey, report, mobility, conference, tool drafting, policy paper, specifications to promote specific purchases, local event, film production, podcast creation, etc.). If you need more space to describe your Student Challenge, report significant details as attachments to the application form. Proposed challenges should have an online component or a mobility dedicated line to enhance accessibility for remote participants across the Alliance.

5. Relevance to Alliance Goals

Explain how the challenge will contribute to advancing our Alliance's core themes of peace, justice, and inclusive societies. Highlight any unique perspectives, issues, or topics that will be addressed.

6. How does your project fit in the thematic focuses of the year?

- Explain how the challenge will contribute to at least one of the themes:

Theme 1: Strengthening Peace: How students and universities can become active agents of peace through concrete actions.

Theme 2: Student Participation in Social Life: The university as a catalyst for inclusion and civic engagement.

7. Impact Goals and Monitoring

Provide an overview of the anticipated impact on the participating students, the campus community, and the wider public. What lasting effects or initiatives do you hope will result from this project?

8. Collaboration Between the Partnership

Explain what is the role of each association.

9. Promotion, Evaluation and Feedback Plan

Describe your approach to attracting attendees and how you will assess the challenge.

10. Tentative Budget

Provide an itemised preliminary budget, including costs related to travel, accommodation, activities and other logistical needs. Ensure clarity and transparency in the financial outline. Consider the main expense categories in the budget form attached.

11. Funding Request from the Alliance

Specify the amount of funding requested from the EUPeace Alliance. We remind you that the EUPeace contribution is 12.000€ maximum per project. The breakdown of the project budget is decided freely within



the partnership and needs to be clearly explained and justified.

Travel expenses can be covered by the budget available to the university of origin.

12. Supporting Documents (optional)

Attach any additional materials (e.g., more detailed organisation of the challenge, letters of intent, preliminary designs, previous event summaries) that support your proposal.

13. Budget approval by the competent administrative representative for WP5 activities

Provide contact details of the EUPeace administrative representative who has validated your budget.
