SHORT DESCRIPTION

This short, asynchronous online course introduces conflict as a social phenomenon shaped by power relations, inequality, and communication practices. Participants will distinguish interpersonal disagreement from conflict dynamics embedded in institutional structures, and identify how authority, norms, and unequal access to voice shape everyday situations of tension. Through concise input units and guided individual reflection tasks, learners will analyse conflict scenarios, reflect on their own positionality, and apply principles of ethical and conflict-sensitive communication. In doing so, the



course prepares students to engage more effectively with diverse communities by strengthening critical awareness and responsible interaction—key competences for participation in community-based initiatives such as Living Labs and societal dialogue formats. The course is suitable for undergraduate and graduate students from all disciplines and requires no prior knowledge.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

After completing this course, students will be able to:

- Identify how power, hierarchy and inequality shape conflict situations
- Recognise the role of communication in sustaining or challenging dominance
- Reflect critically on their own position and responsibilities in conflict contexts

SOFT SKILLS DEVELOPED

This course develops foundational soft skills for conflict-sensitive civic and social engagement. Students will strengthen their ability to:

- Critically interpret conflict dynamics, including structural and institutional dimensions of power
 - Reflect on positionality, acknowledging how one's own role, perspective and authority affect conflict situations
 - Develop ethical communication awareness, recognising how voice, silence and interpretation can reproduce or challenge exclusion
