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SHORT DESCRIPTION

This module introduces mediation as a core soft skill for effective communication in community engagement. Learners will explore how mediation supports mutual understanding, reduces miscommunication, and enables constructive collaboration in diverse social, civic, and professional settings. Drawing on the Council of Europe's CEFR framework, the module situates mediation within language learning, intercultural interaction, and meaning-making, thus highlighting its relevance for working across differences and perspectives.

The module also emphasises mediation as a practical competence for building trust, facilitating dialogue, and supporting inclusive participation in community-based initiatives. By strengthening learners' ability to bridge viewpoints and make communication accessible to all participants, mediation contributes to social cohesion and more effective engagement in collaborative processes. Participants will develop and practise concrete strategies—including paraphrasing, reformulating, summarising, and negotiating meaning—through realistic scenarios linked to community and multi-stakeholder contexts.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

By the end of the course, learners will develop:

Knowledge & Understanding

- Define and explain mediation within the CEFR framework and differentiate it from translation, interpreting, and general communicative interaction.
- Identify and describe the role of mediation in intercultural interaction, collaborative tasks, and conflict-sensitive or high-stakes communication, including community-based and participatory settings.

Applied Skills

- Apply CEFR mediation descriptors to analyse and evaluate communicative situations and select appropriate strategies for inclusive, community-oriented communication.
 - Identify mediation techniques—such as summarising, paraphrasing, simplifying complex
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content, and reformulating messages—to strengthen clarity, shared understanding, and collaborative engagement within groups and communities.

Personal & Reflective Competence

- Reflect on personal communication patterns and assess individual strengths and development needs in mediation competence, recognising mediation as a key factor in supporting participation, social cohesion, and community engagement.
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COURSE CONTENTS

The course covers the following topics:

1. Introduction to mediation as defined in the CEFR framework
 2. Mediation in multilingual and intercultural contexts with a focus on community-based communication and participation
 3. Mediating communication: managing interaction, reducing misunderstandings, negotiating meaning to support inclusive dialogue and social cohesion
 4. Practical examples of mediation in academic, social, and professional scenarios, and community contexts (e.g., summarising, paraphrasing, simplifying, reformulating)
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TEACHING METHODOLOGY

The course adopts a practice-oriented approach grounded in the CEFR mediation framework and teaching activities include:

- Lecture introducing mediation concepts and CEFR descriptors
 - Case-based activities using real communication breakdown examples
 - Demonstration and guided analysis of mediation strategies (summarising, paraphrasing, simplifying, reformulating)
 - Stakeholder-inspired examples, drawing on intercultural and multilingual communication contexts

3	Applied task: analysis of short texts or predefined communication scenarios, with use of mediation strategies such as summarising, paraphrasing, simplifying, and reformulating	Introduction to different scenarios, short videos, multiple choice comprehension tests	40 mins
4	Self-check and clarification phase: clarification of key concepts and guided reflection on mediation strategies and their relevance to academic, professional, and community contexts	Wrap-up of key concepts	10 mins
5	Self-assessment	Matching task	10 mins
