Standard editorial guidelines

Formatting Guidelines

- Maximum length: 3000 words (around 5 pages)
- File format: Microsoft Word (.docx)
- Margins: 2.5 cm left/right; 1.25 cm top/bottom
- Font: Times New Roman, size 12
- Line spacing: single
- Long quotations (more than 3 lines):
 - separated from the main text
 - left and right indent: 1 cm
 - font size 11
 - single spacing
- Citation style: author-date system
Example: (De Luca 2024: 130)
- Footnotes: size 10
- Punctuation rules should follow the language of the contribution (English, French, etc.)

Extended Abstract

Introduction

Provide a concise presentation of the topic, the research problem and the objectives of the contribution.

Theoretical Framework / Context

Present the conceptual framework, literature background and/or context of the study.

Methodology

Explain the methodological approach, materials, case studies, empirical sources or analytical framework used.

Results / Main Arguments

Present the principal findings, arguments or reflections developed in the contribution.

Conclusion

Summarise the contribution's main outcomes, relevance and possible implications.

(maximum 5 references)
